President's Message

Dear Members,

Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed, to me: I lift my lamp beside the golden door. —Emma Lazarus' poem, inscribed on the Statue of Liberty

Immigration is a very hot topic right now. European nations are currently dealing with the tremendous number of people seeking shelter from their homelands. Legislation is pending in Congress to deal with the United States' treatment of immigrants and to address their political standing. Our bevy of presidential hopefuls have mentioned the topic – some in a sympathetic way, others endorsing exclusionary views.

The definition of immigration is "The movement of non-native people into a country in order to settle there." It is estimated that there are over 230 million international immigrants, which accounts for about 3% of the world's population. The majority of immigrants settle in developed countries. They are seeking escape from their homelands where poverty, religious persecution and political upheaval has made their living conditions unbearable. Most are leaving countries which lack resources in hope of finding a better standard of living.

Fear is the most common reason why citizens oppose accepting immigrants – fear of straining resources and increasing taxes, fear of lost jobs, and fear of terrorism.

Most of us can trace our ancestry back to another country. Our national was built by the hard work and perseverance of those who came to America, seeking prosperity and freedom. I can trace my family heritage back to Italy, Ireland, England and Germany. How about you?

Public Policy

Lisa Matz, VP of Government Relations testified at a hearing entitled "Preventing and Responding to Sexual Assault on College Campuses" before the House Subcommittee on Higher Education and Workforce Training. She was honored to be invited and to represent AAUW and satisfied to see the issue taken seriously. The cooperative atmosphere is what is needed in creating effective policies for this nationwide problem. Lisa's participation in this hearing was a team effort and the team will continue the push for meaningful legislation to make college campuses safe across the country.

The Department of Labor announced a final rule that would prohibit federal contractors from retaliating against employees who wish to discuss and share information about salaries. This rule serves to implement President Obama's 2014 Executive Order promoting pay transparency and openness. The final rule will take effect on January 11, 2016.

State spotlight is on the city of Boston. This great city is partnering with AAUW to offer free salary negotiation workshops for women. Mayor Marty Walsh announced that there will be ten two-hour workshops this fall, and over the next five years. They seek to reach 90,000 women. These women will learn to identify a target salary, negotiate a benefits package and effectively ask for raises. The workshops aim to close the gender pay gap for the city.

Congressman Jim Costa of the 16th District of California, memorialized a former California Chapter President of AAUW, Rosellen Kershaw. In his tribute, Costa honored her with descriptions of her numerous achievements and commitments as a "professional volunteer".

Harvard law professor Lawrence Lessig announced his bid for the Democratic nomination in the presidential race with his main policy focusing on reforming campaign finance.

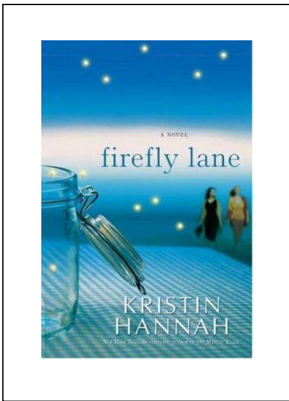
New health regulations in the Affordable Care Act will now protect all genders under the proposed rule of Nondiscrimination in Health Programs and Activities. In particular, this will extend protection to transgender people by granting them the right to use gender-appropriate restrooms and by prohibiting insurance companies from denying coverage.

The Department of Education released new information that shows a decrease in the student loan default rate. Two community colleges, one private non-profit school, and twelve for-profit schools could lose federal financial aid due to high default rates.

The AAUW Book Club will meet on the third Friday, October 16, at 2:00 pm, at the Palm Springs Library. Virginia Farace will lead the discussion of **Firefly Lane** by Kristin Hannah.



Summary: A powerful novel of love, loss, and the magic of friendship. . . . In the turbulent summer of 1974, Kate Mularkey has accepted her place at the bottom of the eighth-grade social food chain. Then, to her amazement, the "coolest girl in the world" moves in across the street and wants to be her friend. Tully Hart seems to have it all---beauty, brains, ambition. On the surface they are as opposite as two people can be: Kate, doomed to be forever uncool, with a loving family who mortifies her at every turn. Tully, steeped in glamour and mystery, but with a secret that is destroying her. They make a pact to be best friends forever; by summer's end they've become Tully and Kate...inseparable.

So begins Kristin Hannah's magnificent new novel. Spanning more than three decades and playing out across the ever-changing face of the Pacific Northwest, **Firefly Lane** is the poignant, powerful story of two women and the friendship that becomes the bulkhead of their lives. For thirty years, Tully and Kate buoy each other through life, weathering the storms of friendship---jealousy, anger, hurt, resentment. They think they've survived it all until a single act of betrayal tears them apart . . . and puts their courage and friendship to the ultimate test.

More than a coming-of-age novel, it's the story of a generation of women who were both blessed and cursed by choices. It's about promises and secrets and betrayals. And ultimately, about the one person who really, truly knows you---and knows what has the power to hurt you . . . and heal you. Firefly Lane is a story you'll never forget . . . one you'll want to pass on to your best friend.
